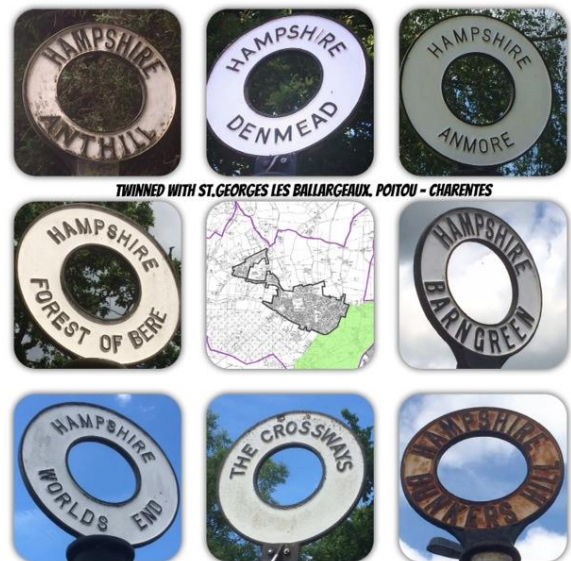


## Denmead Neighbourhood Plan - A message of thanks

As you will read elsewhere on this page, **the Denmead Neighbourhood Plan (DNP) successfully passed its referendum** and on 1st April 2015 it was formally accepted ('made') by Winchester City Council (WCC) in full session. The Neighbourhood Plan has become part of the regulations that Winchester's Planning Department will use to decide planning applications in the Parish.

People in Denmead contributed to the Forum discussions at the start of the work, and others became involved in Work Packages which gathered evidence and developed particular policies. The small Steering Group was formed early on, and despite changes of personnel over the three year gestation of the Plan, it led the work to its completion. They know who they are, and their names are recorded in the minutes and notes of the many meetings held along the way.



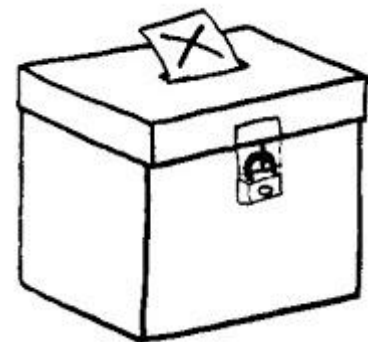
It would not have been possible to produce the DNP without the help of this large group of people and through this article, the Parish Council wishes to thank them all.

## Speeding Kills!

Speeding is cited by many residents as the number one problem in the village and you may have seen the article advising that we are trying to get a Community Speedwatch programme up and running.

In addition to the Speedwatch programme, we have purchased a small number of speed warning stickers. The stickers can be put on wheelie bins and, each Wednesday, they will act as a timely reminder to those speeding through our village.

We would like to remind people that bins shouldn't be left out except on waste collection days, and research has shown that infrequent prompts, such as a once a week sign appearing, are more effective as reminders. However, if, like me, you don't really want to look at a 'Speed kills – please slow down' sign in your garden every day, you can put the sticker on the back of the bin under the handle. That way, when the handle faces the road to make collection easier, the sign will be facing the road!



Residents advise us that their main areas of concern for speeding are Forest Road, Hambledon Road, Bunkers Hill and Anmore Road. If you live on any of these roads, and would like stickers for your bins, please call the Parish Clerks on 02392 247947 or drop into the Parish Office at The Old School in School Lane.

## The Hambledon and Denmead Welfare and Educational Trust

This charity resulted from the merger in 2008, with the approval of the Charity Commission, of the Educational Charity of John Ring and the Hambledon and Denmead Welfare Trust.

The charity is for the benefit of residents of Hambledon and Denmead. Meetings of the Trustees are held alternately at the two villages and both appoint Trustees.

The Educational Charity of John Ring was long established and The Hambledon and Denmead Welfare Trust itself resulted from the merger, in 1968 of five separate charitable Trusts, all set up

in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century by various local Denmead and Hambledon benefactors.

These included charities set up in the names of John Foster, Dora Goldsmith, and another charity for fuel set up in the name of John Ring. John Ring was mentioned in Terry Norman's Book "Journeys to Yesterday." In the 1814 Enclosure of the Anmore area of Denmead, he was allotted land close to Anmore Dell. He lived in Hambledon and had land in several local areas. He died on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1834 and in his Will, having provided for a "neat and handsome tomb", which may still be seen in Hambledon churchyard, he left a substantial bequest for the Education of children residing in Chidden and Hambledon. "The children to go regularly to the parish church of Hambledon every Sunday, in order that they may become good, industrious and honest members of society."

These charities, therefore, provided an interesting link with the past. Local residents, who were able to donate or bequeath funds, felt it their duty to help their less well-off neighbours. Early use of the funds included coal at Christmas and shoes for children walking to school. Also small pensions were awarded to one or two individuals.

The Objects of the Hambledon and Denmead Welfare and Educational Trust are 'to relieve either generally or individually persons resident in the area of benefit who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress and to promote the education of persons resident in the area who have not attained the age of 25 years and who in the opinion of the Trustees are in need of financial assistance.'

Over the years, the type of application for help has changed and recently most have been requests by Denmead and Hambledon youngsters who are saving up to go on organised educational visits, both at home and abroad.

Trustees were pleased recently to receive a cash gift towards the funds of the Trust (possibly the first since 1834!) Other donations to help this worthwhile local charity would be gratefully received.

Applications can be made to the Clerk to the Trustees, Brian Bellinger 9263 2498 or the Chairman, John Spiller 9263 2425. These are then considered by the Trustees.

Amounts are small but it is pleasant to think that the benefactors are still able to help and encourage local children, people and organisations, so many years after they lived in a very different Denmead and Hambledon.

## What is your child doing online?

Once again there has been much in the news recently about youngsters running up large bills by downloading apps and accessories for their online games. Whilst it's easy to think it won't happen to me, do any of us really understand what our youngsters get up to online?! Even if you're a computer whizz, it's still likely that you'll be playing catch-up with the way your child is using the internet (remember how you had to operate the Betamax video for your parents?!)

As your child grows and becomes more independent, it is only natural that they take this independence online. In our teenage years we explore, try new things, push boundaries and take risks; this is an essential part of growing up, even if it does lead to grey hair for parents.

The internet has changed all of our lives – and makes shopping so much easier! Of course, our kids have grown up during this change. Many of the things that confuse, baffle or even alarm us are part of their everyday life.

Talk to your child about what they're up to online. Be a part of their online life; involve the whole family and show an interest. Find out what sites they visit and what they love about them. If they know you understand, they are more likely to come to you if they have any problems.

Encourage your child to go online and explore! There is a wealth of age-appropriate sites online for your children. Encourage them to use sites which are fun, educational and that will help them to develop online skills.

Keep up-to-date with your child's development online. Children grow up fast and they will be growing in confidence and learning new skills daily. It is important that as your child learns more, so do you.

Set boundaries in the online world just as you would in the real world. Think about what they might see, what they share, who they talk to and how long they spend online. It is important to discuss boundaries at a young age to develop the tools and skills children need to enjoy their time online.

This year's ride is on 25<sup>th</sup> July starting from the Harvest Home. A 10, 20 or 35 mile route can be chosen, and should cater for all abilities. There will also be other activities besides the cycling.

Keep all equipment that connects to the internet in a family space. For children of this age, it is important to keep internet use in family areas so you can see the sites your child is using and be there for them if they stumble across something they don't want to see.

Know what connects to the internet and how! Nowadays even the TV connects to the internet (you might not realise that it does, but your teenagers certainly will!). Make sure you're aware of which devices that your child uses to connect to the internet, such as their phone or games console. Also, find out how they are accessing the internet – is it your connection, a free wifi hotspot or even a neighbour's wifi?! This will affect whether the safety settings you set are being applied.

Use parental controls on devices that link to the internet, such as the TV, laptops, computers, games consoles and mobile phones. Parental controls are not just about locking and blocking, they are a tool to help you set appropriate boundaries as your child grows and develops. They are not as difficult to install as you might think!

The service is funded with support from Denmead Parish Council and a grant from HCC Councillor Stallard.

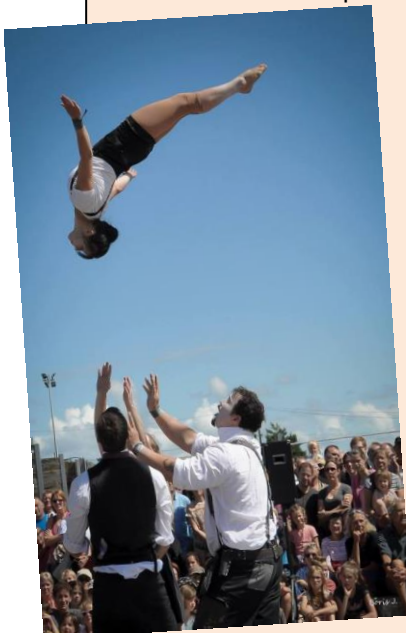
## Young People's Circus Project.

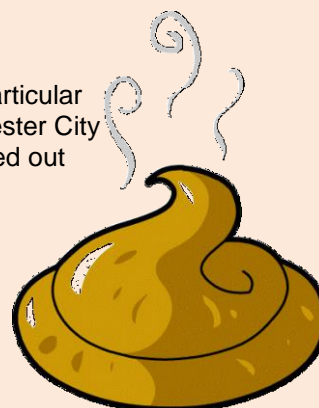

In addition, there will be children's activities, hand-outs and treats.

## DOGS (FOULING OF LAND) ACT 1996

Denmead has become the target of irresponsible dog owners in recent months. Of particular concern are the school routes that include Bere Road and Ashling Park Road. Winchester City Council (WCC) have identified this area as a dog fouling hotspot and patrols are carried out regularly in an attempt to catch offenders.

"Most owners clean up after their dogs these days," explains Dave Griffiths, WCC's Senior Animal Welfare Officer, "it is only a small percentage who are irresponsible so being in the right place at the right time is a 'needle in a haystack' scenario. That's why we need the help of members of the public".



### How you can help

Offenders need to be identified. Should you witness an owner failing to clean up after their dog in an area to which the general public have access and you know the offender's address, please report the incident to the Council and appropriate action will be taken.

We would ask you to state that you saw the dog defecate on public land and that the owner left the land without clearing up, give a description of the dog and the person walking the dog, where that person lives, give the exact time and date that the offence occurred and the exact location.

Where a dog is loose without an owner or keeper present, fouling is still an offence if the owner is traced.

### The law

The Act applies to all areas to which the general public have access with the exception of agricultural land, commercial woodland, marshland, moors, heath, rural common land and carriageways with a speed limit over 40mph. Privately owned land is included if the owner wants the Act in place and if the general public have access to the land; private gardens and drives are not included. Remember that leaving a bag of dog faeces on public land is not complying with the law unless it is placed in a bin.

Offenders caught by the Dog Wardens may be issued with a fixed penalty fine of £50 Failure to pay the fine may lead to prosecution with a maximum penalty of £1000. Guide dog owners are exempt from the law.

## A Councillor's Retrospective.....

I decided not to stand for re-election this year for several reasons - an increase in the demands of grand-parenting, the fact that I have been on the Committee for nearly eleven years and that recently several younger, willing and proactive councillors have joined and become involved. It was the right time for me to leave.

DPC has been designated as a Quality Parish for good reason. Both its administrative and ground staff do an excellent job and the Councillors represent an apolitical group of volunteers who have Denmead's best interests at heart. Such commitment will undoubtedly continue. Much has happened over the last decade and I thought I might put some of it on record.

**The Planning Committee:** has sat about 180 times and has considered approximately 1150 planning applications most of which have required a visit, some discussion and liaison with WCC.....enough said!

**The Highways and General Purposes Committee:** has been responsible for the increase in the number of bus shelters, seats, litter and dog waste bins; the establishing of the 30mph speed limit throughout the village; the upkeep of the burial ground; the naming of all the Greenways; a street lighting initiative which ensures that all the lights are regularly maintained; new Christmas lights for the tree on the village green; the introduction of dropped kerbs to aid road crossing; the improvement of road junctions and parking restrictions around the schools on Hambledon Road and the road works about to start at the Southwick Road roundabout and Bunker's Hill where a footpath is to be created to allow safer pedestrian access to Creech Woods. The list could go on!

**The Amenities Committee:** has overseen the successful refurbishment of the children's play areas at the King George V field (including the

skate park) as well as in Mill Close and the Barn area; the revamp of car parks in Southwick Road and Ashling Park Road; the introduction of village notice boards; the planting and care of established



trees and the maintenance of hedgerows and grassy areas; the preparation of sports pitches; the installation of a new CCTV system and vandal-proof roofing at the pavilion; the construction of a jogging track at Harvest Field and the ongoing improvement of the Goodman Fields, where it is planned to improve access by creating a new car park. The latter two areas

have both been accepted for QE2 Fields status which confers a permanent protection against any future development. The efforts of the Youth Working Party have gone from strength to strength and it has an excellent reputation with the youth workers in the area. As before the list could go on!

All the above activities were of course ratified by the full Council which has the ultimate say in anything that happens. Recently the Denmead Neighbourhood Plan was approved by WCC and accepted by the inhabitants of Denmead at the recent referendum. This arguably is one of the most significant acts in recent years. The Steering Group responsible, ably overseen by Councillor N. Lander-Brinkley, has provided a planning document which returns a degree of autonomy to the village in outlining what happens to Denmead in the coming years and as such is an extremely important development.

To finish, and just for fun, I worked out my time commitment (gladly given) to DPC over the years. The results are surprising. Given that for almost eleven years I spent about two hours per week on Council business, the maths suggests that I made a contribution of 1144 hours or 48 days! Others do far more and the Council succeeds because of the willing input of its members. It deserves both the support and respect of the inhabitants of Denmead.
